Un Friday, June 7, 1968, I received a call from Attorney William S. Howell of the Immigration Department, 300 No. Los Angeles Street, Rm. 8105, telephone 688-2805, concerning the above entitled case and Juvenile Court Case No. 343777-0235062-FO-New.

Mr. Howell informed me that the above defendant is subject to deportation; that following his conviction of narcotic charges under the general laws, his case was referred to and accepted by the Juvenile Court. Mr. Howell contends that this is illegal under decisions with which he is familiar; that it is more difficult to deport an individual when the proceedings are in the Juvenile Court. Mr. Howell wanted to discuss the matter with someone in this office and see if the situation could be corrected so that deportation would be simplified. I have obtained the Superior Court file and observed that the matter was litigated in the Northeast Judicial District, and that this is within the Branch and Area Offices.Division.

Deputy District Attorney Harry Sondheim and I have observed the minute orders in the Superior Court file and on their face, the orders may well have been legal dependent upon what the court reporter's notes show and what the proceedings in the Juvenile Court may reflect.

I am calling this matter to your special attention because I understand the above defendant is the brother of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, who is accused of murdering Robert F. Kennedy. I am returning the Superior Court file to the Los Angeles

County Clerk's Office, because although both of my secretaries are deputy county clerks, they are not authorized to deliver the file to anyone but me.

My secretary has called Mr. Howell and has informed him that the matter is being referred to you and the Branch and Area Offices Division and that someone will contact/him.

5. Possible Connection Between New York Arrests and Our Investigation

Chief Houghton discussed the Northern California post office box addresses obtained from the New York investigation and stated that S.U.S. had followed up on these addresses. At this point the only connection is that apparently one of the Namer sons worked in Northern California as a crop worker and used one or more post office boxes registered to other Arabs. This investigation is continuing.

6. Activities of Bishara Sirhan During Six Years in New York

Addresses developed from immigration files indicating that the senior Sirhan lived in New York between 1959 to 1963 and 1964 to 1966 have been forwarded to the F.B.I. for follow up.

Suggestions As To Need For Further Investigation

Lt. Pena asked if the possibility of Sirhan's membership in other Arabic organizations could be ascertained. Bill Nolen indicated that the Sirhan names have been run through all available files with negative results.

Munir's Possession of Gun

Chief asked the District Attorney what decision, if any, had been reached on the prima facie case against Munir for his possession of the gun used by Sirhan. John Howard and Dave Fitts indicated that a disposition from their office was a matter of timeliness and that no action had been taken until this time due to maintaining rapport with the family. They will confer with Buck Compton as soon as he returns and will arrive at some sort of a decision. This decision should result in either a rejection in writing or a complaint against Munir. In commenting on the rapport with the family, the District Attorney indicated that Adel and the mother were truthful and that we were still getting limited cooperation from Adel. Munir has not been truthful in the past, and we do not expect him to be in the future. It was agreed that using the defense's investigator, Michael McGowan, for any type of assistance was not desirable.

Grant Cooper Enters the Case

In a discussion of the effect of Grant Cooper's involvement, Matt Byrnes indicated that Cooper was facing a possible indictment for his illegal possession of a Grand Jury transcript involved in the Friars Trial. If he were to be indicted prior to the trial date, or during the trial, it could have an effect on his status as one of Sirhan's attorneys. Matt Byrnes asked that everyone treat this information as confidential.

Sirhan didn't have any close friends. He talked about a guy out at the Corona Ranch. Sirhan also knew a man named Ivan who worked at Allied Auto Supply on Colorado Boulevard. Sirhan got his car fixed through Ivan.

Sirhan spent a lot of time at the library reading about philosophy, supernatural and mental things. Sirhan was very nervous after the horse fall, but he was always hard to get along with. Sirhan lived away from home when he worked at Corona Horse Ranch. Sirhan had been staying out late at night recently.

This Department is in the process of finalizing its investigation of the Senator Robert F. Kennedy assassination. One aspect of the case which remains open is the purchase of the revolver used to shoot the Senator.

Our investigation revealed that the weapon was purchased during the month of February, 1968, in Pasadena, California by Munir Sirhan, an alien. This act constituted a violation of California Penal Code Section 12021, a felony.

This aspect of the case was discussed with John Howard of the District Attorney's Office early in the investigation. He rade the decision to delay possible prosecution regarding Munir Sirhan's purchase of the revolver until after the trial of Sirhan Sirhan.

As the purchase of the gun took place in your jurisdiction, this Department is forwarding the results of its investigation to you for whatever action you desire to take.

Officer Young looked further and found a white business envelope with a return address, Argonaut Insurance Company, 443 Shatto Place, Los Angeles, California, postmarked October 27, 1967, from Los Angeles. The back of the envelope contained penciled handwriting that read, "R.F.K. must be disposed of D D D Disposed of Sidposed Disposed of properly Robert Fitzgerald Kennedy must soon die die die die die die die die die." Also found in the trash were two small notebook papers containing Arabic letterings, and the name of Sirhan Sirhan. Officer Young booked these items at Pasadena Police Station under their Case Number 566123.

On June 7, 1968, 11:07 a.m., these items were given to Officer D. L. Klein, Rampart Detectives. Klein booked the items into

Mr. Cooper was telephonically interviewed on June 8, 1971 at 1430 hours. Cooper declined to be personally interviewed, stating that he was opposed to giving a formal statement, and he would not want to testify in any type of hearing regarding challenges to DeWayne Wolfer's competency.

Note: The issue of Mr. Cooper testifying was not proposed by Lt. Booth. Cooper was only asked to be personally interviewed.

Cooper stated that sometime prior to the Sirhan trial he received a telephone call from Bill Harper. Harper stated that he had no confidence in DeWayne Wolfer because Wolfer did not always testify accurately. Cooper told Harper that the apprehensions expressed by Harper made no difference in the Sirhan case as the issues to which Wolfer would testify in light of the numerous witnesses at the scene of Sirhan's crime would not be the critical issues.

Cooper stated that to the best of his recollection the gun used by Sirhan to commit his crime was not produced during Wolfer's testimony in the trial; however, Cooper believes that the reason for this was explained by Wolfer at the time he testified.

Sometime after the Sirhan trial, Theodore Charach, 4131 Laurel Grove Avenue, Studio City, phone 876-5568, went to Cooper's office and informed him that Wolfer had "messed up" by giving erroneous testimony regarding the testing of certain guns critical to the case against Sirhan. Charach had allegedly conducted an investigation into the Sirhan case and arrived at the expressed opinion that someone other than Sirhan had fired the fatal shot at Senator Kennedy.

Cooper expressed disbelief to Charach, in Charach's alleged evidence; however, he referred Charach to Bill Harper for Harper to use the information as he saw fit. Cooper stated he has a "great deal" of confidence in Bill Harper. Bill Harper apparently conducted an investigation into the Sirhan case, incorporating the information from Charach.

Cooper stated he was not satisfied with the weapon test conducted by Wolfer in the Sirhan case; however, he did not believe that Wolfer's testimony "made any difference to the case."

Cooper believes that Charach is represented by an attorney from Beverly Hills. He does not know the name of Charach's attorney.

I was in charge o ace guards working Ambassado Hotel on election night June 4, 1968. We were supposed to work security for Kennedy Party, but I was informed by MR. UNO TIMONSEN of hotel and HUGH MCDONALD of Kennedy Party that no uniform security was wanted. We were assigned crowd control inside the hotel and I was stationed at main doors to the Embassy Room with Stowers another ace guard and fire department men. I could tell from the crowd that Kennedy had finished speaking so I looked inside the door just as he was leaving the stage. Prior to this time, at 7:30pm 8:00pm I had suggested to TIMONSEN and MCDONALD that KENNEDY leave by a different exit than the one used to enter, for security reasons. They agreed this was a good idea and would be complied with. I tho ght they would turn left from rear of the stage and go down stairs to Ambassador Ballroom. A short time after KENNEDY left the stage, while I was still at the main doors, a woman came runni g out yelling, "My God we nned a doctor, KENNEDY'S been killed. This woman came from the door leading from the kitchen area (East End) into hall outside the main doors to Embassy. He drew his gun. I then ran into the kitchen by the same door and observed two men (Hctel Employees) struggling with a man, and I saw KENNEDY on the floor. I immediately went into the Embassy Room and phoned for police and ambulance. The operator stated this call had been placed. During evening I had seen three women wearing polka dot dresses, and when I entered the kitchen area just after the s ooting a woman and 2 men leaving area where shoo ing occurred through ; the large doorway going into t e kitchen. They seemed to be smiling- one was a M/C age unk 6.- 6:2 200 dk hair dk suit .one was M/C age unk short, thin dk hair sk suit, the female was blond wearing white dress with dark polka dots. They went out of sight into the kitchen. I don't know if I would recognize them. I don't know anyone who had a camera.

Informant is police reporter for Los Angeles Times - 625-2345 - assigned to the Temple City Office. P/R states he was standing four to five feet from Senator Kennedy when he was shot. Saw Kennedy backing away with arms up - raised toward head-as Sirhan with snub-nosed gun held extended and high, charged toward the Senator and fired the gun several times. Saw Kennedy slump to floor and then observed a very large man (probably Bill Barry) rush Sirhan and pin him against steel table. At this time the gun fell from Sirhan's hand to top of table where informant claims he grabbed the gun, but it was quickly taken away from him by Bill Barry (he thinks).
